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## 1.1 Context

The Nunavut Planning Commission (NPC) is preparing a land use plan to guide and direct resource use and development in the Nunavut Settlement Area (NSA). As part of its efforts, the NPC is facilitating discussions in each Nunavut community on land use and resource management issues. Information that is obtained from these discussions will be used to inform decisions regarding the further development of the Nunavut Land Use Plan (NLUP).

## 1.2 Purpose

This report presents information obtained during the NPC's visit to the community of Ivujivik. The purpose of the report is to inform decisions regarding the further development of the NLUP, ensuring that the plan reflects the priorities and values of residents.

It is important to note that the information contained in the Community Report will be considered in conjunction with all other feedback when revising the DNLUP.

## 1.3 Methodology

Information was presented to and received from participants in Ivujivik in accordance with the Nunavut Planning Commission's Community Engagement Strategy (Engagement Strategy). The Engagement Strategy provides for the following methods for presenting and receiving information;

- **Elected Officials Meeting;** The NPC Chairperson and NPC staff met with senior and elected officials in the community. The development process for the DNLUP, its content and next steps were presented. Comments and questions were recorded during the session and are contained in Appendix 1.
- **Public Workshop;** A formal presentation of the Draft Plan content was provided to participants, including a slide overview of its content. Following the presentation, questions and comments were received from participants. The questions, comments and responses are contained in Appendix 2.

A mapping session followed the presentation of the Draft Plan. The mapping session involved discussions regarding the topics presented in the DNLUP and encouraged participants to identify additional areas and issues important for inclusion in a NLUP. Information received during this session was recorded by NPC staff and is included in Appendix 3.

Areas that participants identified during mapping sessions as important to a particular goal have, in the majority of cases, been included in this report as they were recorded. In instances where participants identified an area that was better suited to another goal, the area has been reclassified to the more suitable goal and has been verified as appropriate to do so by the Community.

## 1.4 Public Awareness

The NPC raised public awareness regarding its visit to Ivujivik in accordance with the Engagement Strategy.

The DNLUP and supporting materials were mailed to the Mayor and Council of Ivujivik in September 2012. In addition, letters of invitation were sent to the Ivujivik Mayor and Council in advance of the NPC's visit to advise of the meetings and to encourage participation. Follow up phone calls were also made.

Public notice of the various events was provided in the following ways:

- **Nunatsiaq News;** notice of community meetings were posted in both newspapers a minimum of 45 days in advance.
- **Community radio;** notices were read by the hosts and a live interview with the Commission Chairperson was conducted.
- **Community bulletin boards;** notices were posted on bulletin boards around the community 45 days and again 14 days in advance of the meetings.

- **Community mail drop;** one page flyers that announced the meetings and their purpose were delivered to the post office in each community for all mail boxes that accept unaddressed ad-mail.
- **nunavut.ca;** the schedule of community visits, the Draft Plan, and all supporting information was available on the Commission's website.

## 1.5 Community Population and Participation

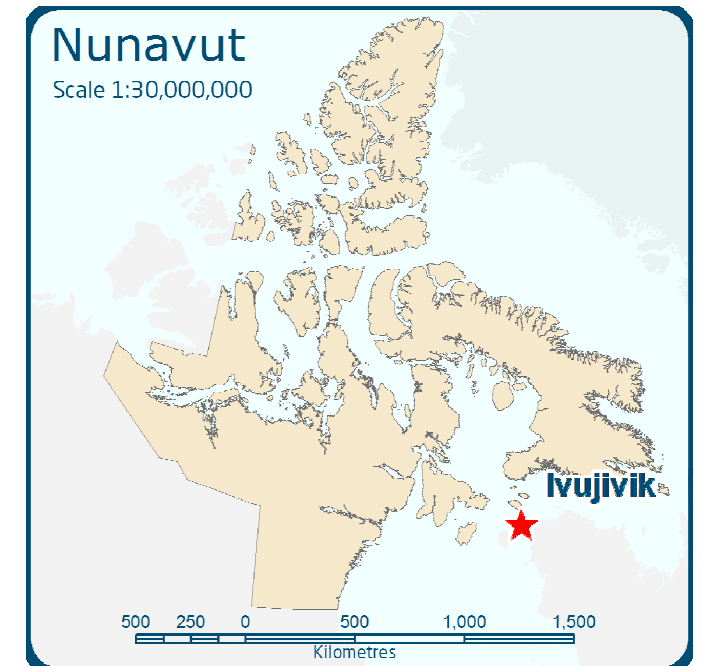


Figure 1. Location of Ivujivik.

Ivujivik is a community of approximately 370 people (Statistics Canada, 2011 Census). It is located on the Hudson Strait in northern Quebec (see Figure 1).

The Commission visited the community on May 2-3, 2013. Participants were also brought in from Inukjuak and Akulivik. The sessions were attended as follows;

- **Elected Officials Meeting;** members of the village Council, and the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Association attended the elected officials meeting.
- **Public Workshop;** approximately 20 people attended the presentation of the DNLUP and facilitated mapping sessions. Information was recorded in 2 separate mapping groups.

# Chapter 2: Protecting and Sustaining the Environment

Protecting and Sustaining the Environment was one of five topics presented to and discussed by participants during the Elected Officials Meeting, Public Workshop and Wrap up Session, collectively referred to in this document as information sharing and gathering sessions.

## 2.1 Areas presented to participants

During the information sharing and gathering sessions, participants were presented the following areas and issues as important to Protecting and Sustaining the Environment.

- Key bird habitat sites
- Caribou Habitat sites
- Atlantic Cod Lakes
- Cumulative Impacts
- Transboundary considerations
- Climate change

The importance of these issues and areas to Protecting and Sustaining the Environment was not disputed by participants during the information sharing and gathering sessions.

## 2.2 Areas identified by participants

- Arctic char

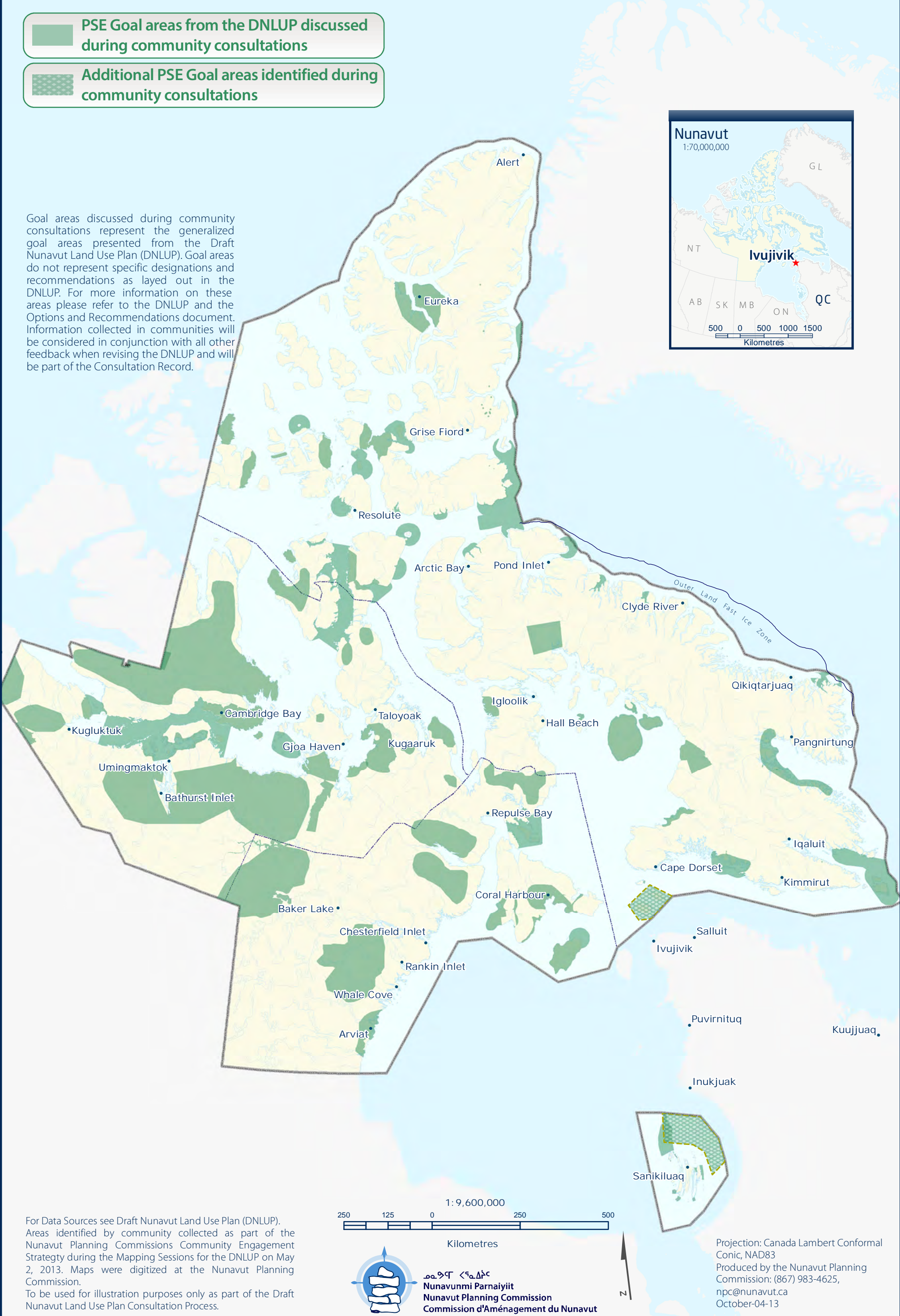

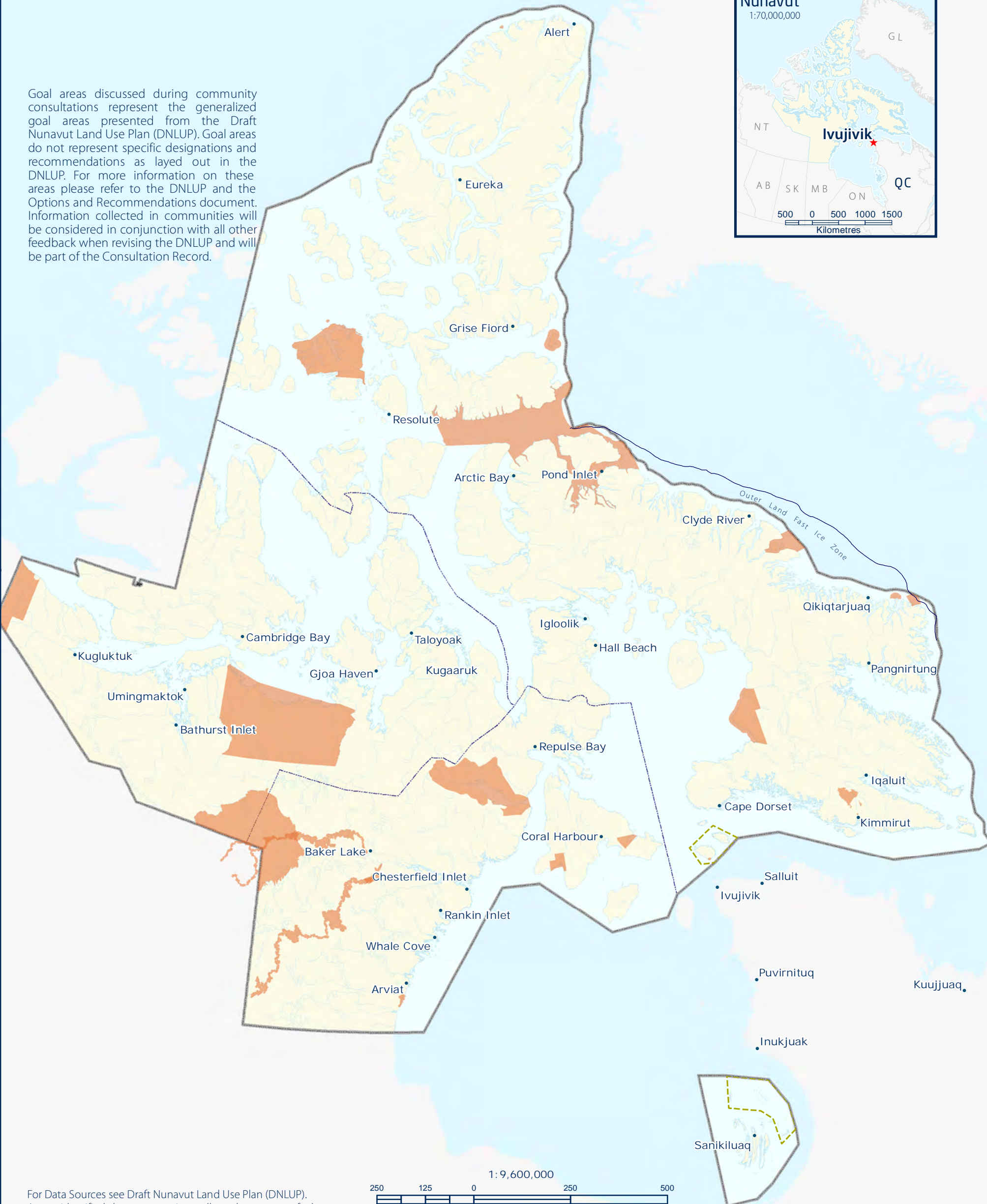


ECP Goal areas from the DNLUP discussed during community consultations

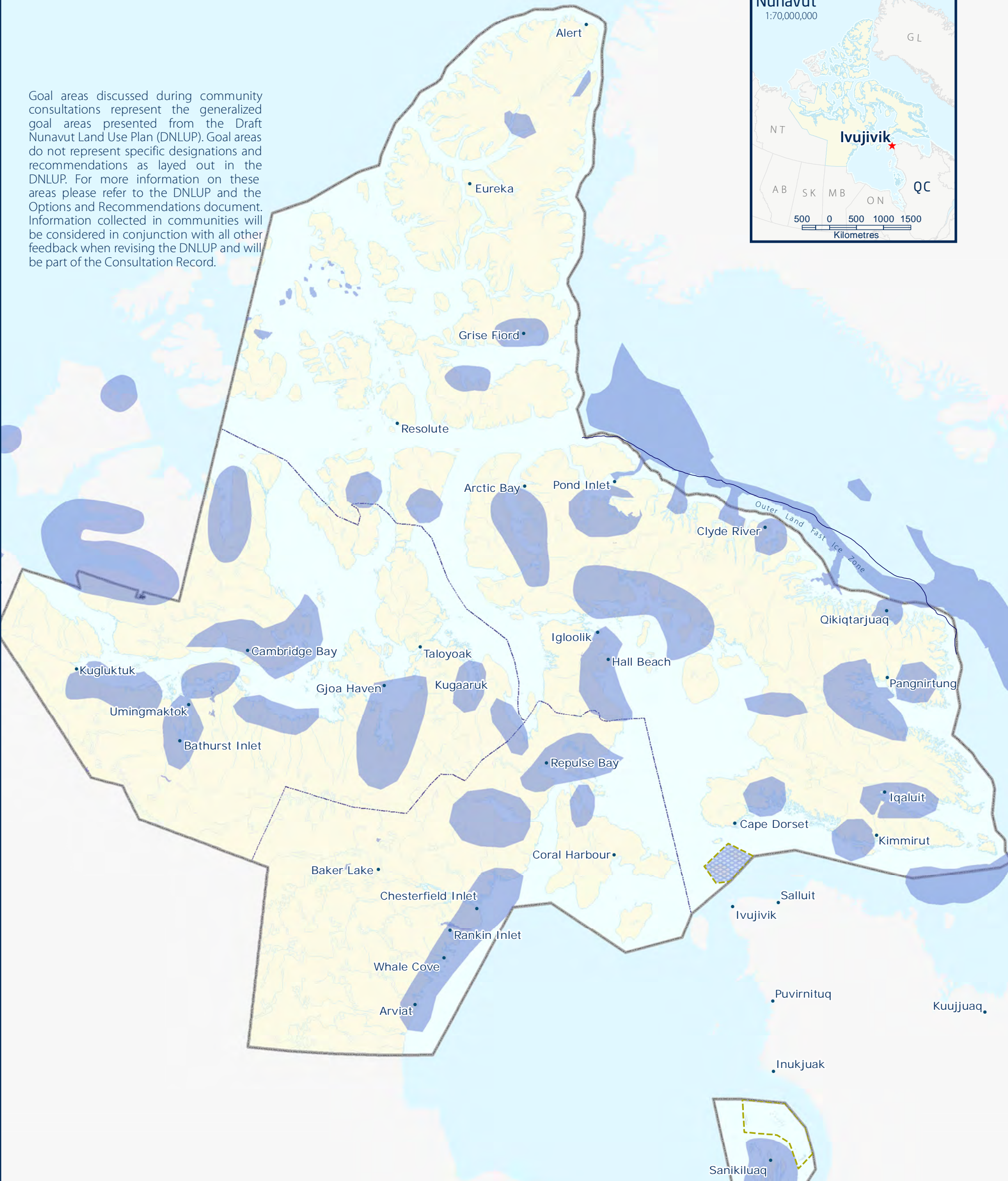

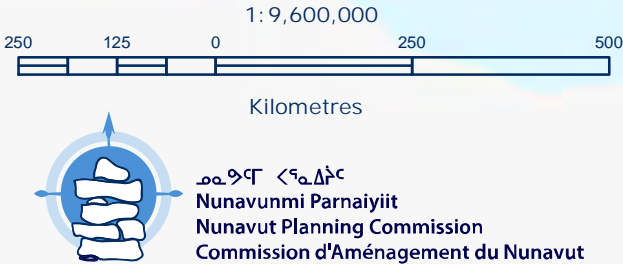


-  ESED Goal areas from the DNLUP discussed during community consultations

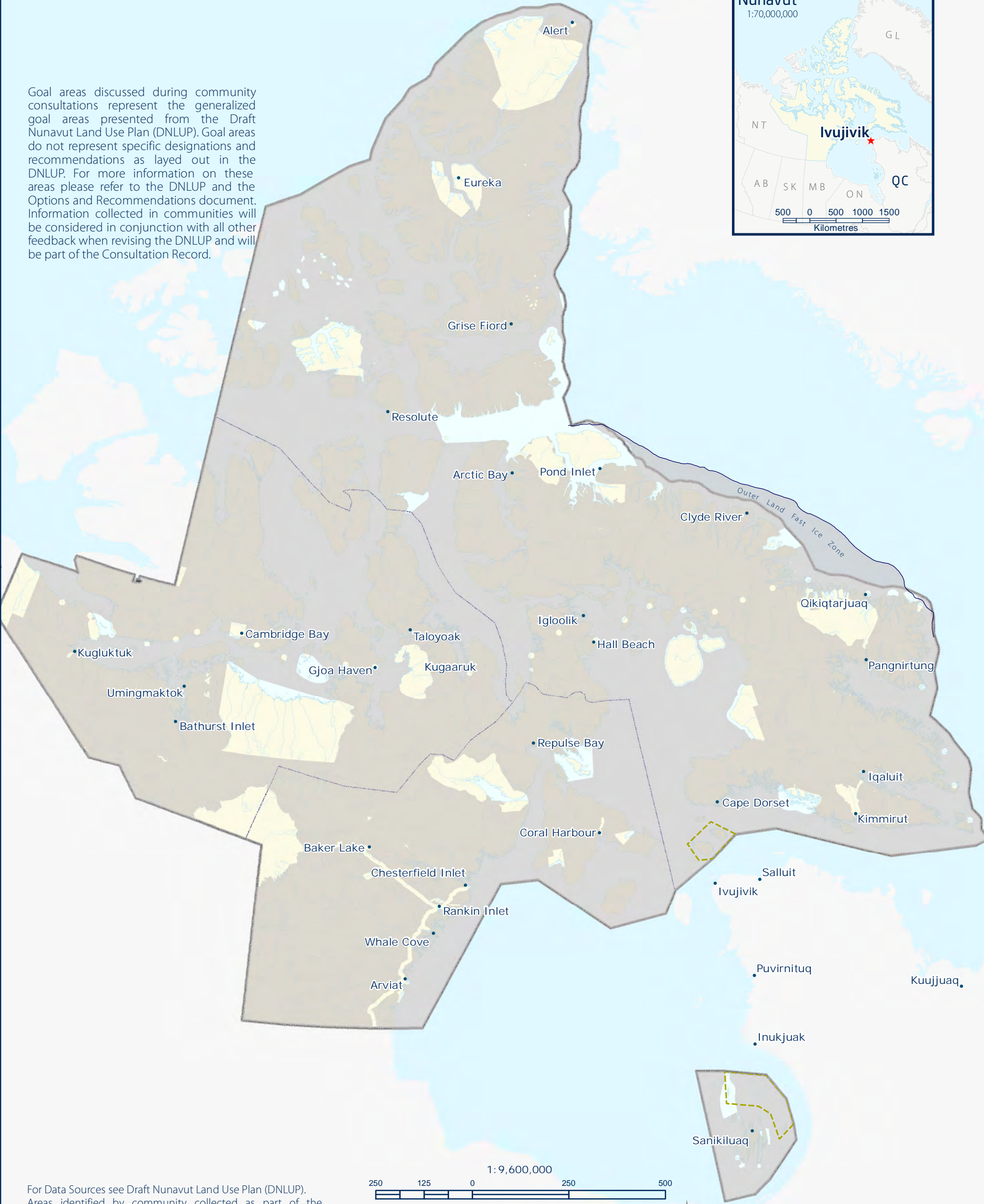






MU Goal areas from DNLUP discussed during community consultations

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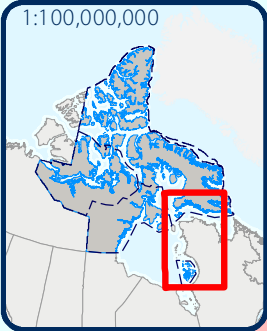
### 7.1 Areas identified for multiple goals

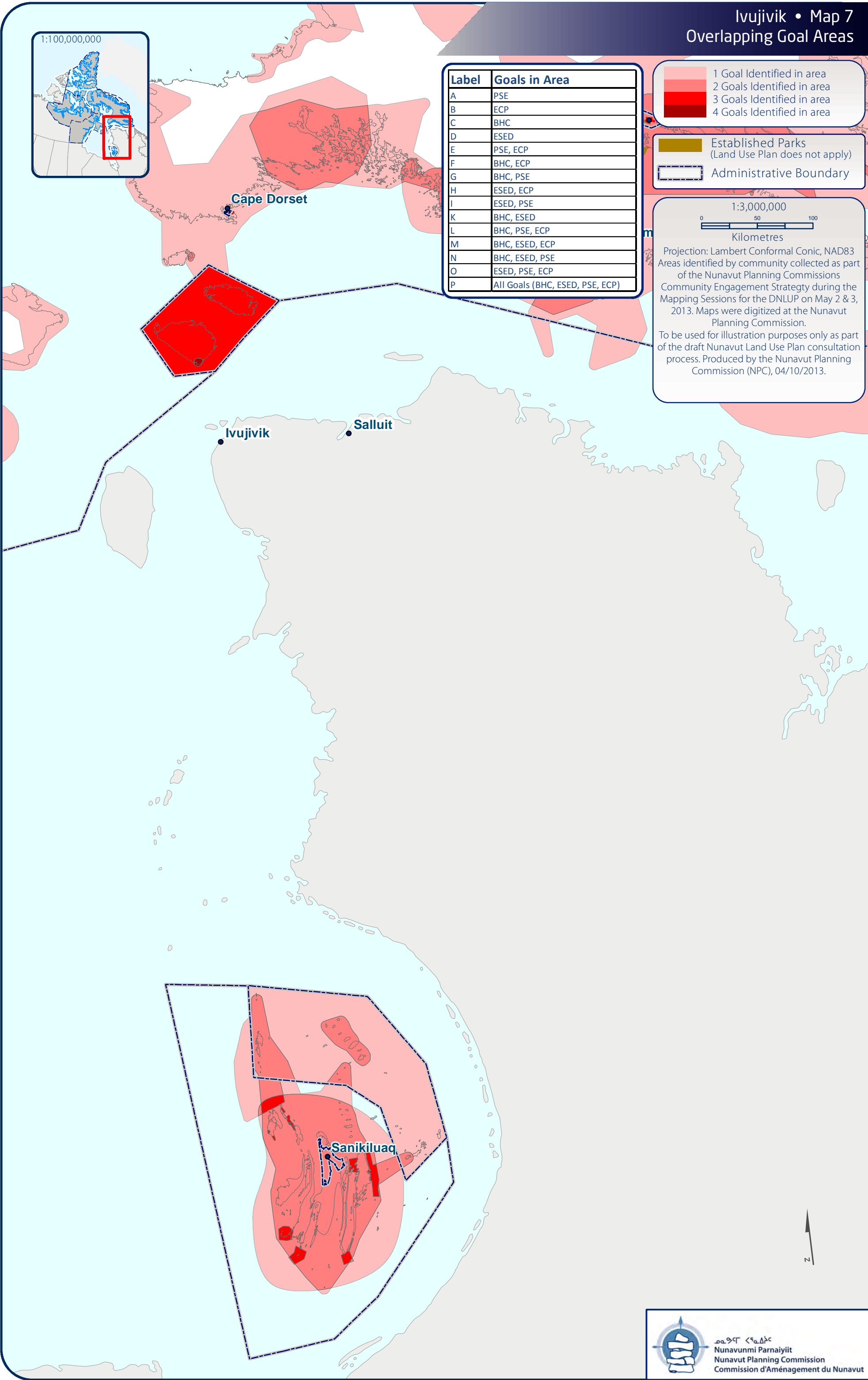
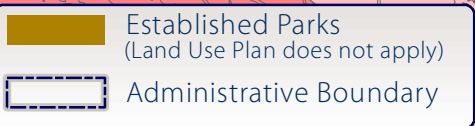




Ivujivik • Map 7

## Appendix 1: Elected Officials Meeting

The elected officials meeting was attended by the Mayor and members of the Hamlet Council and HTO. During the meeting, participants raised the following issues:

- Interested in an agreement to be able to get soapstone from Baffin Island
- Concerned with the increase in ship traffic
- Concerned about impacts from shipping on wildlife
- There needs to be a management plan in place for harvesting
- Concerned about walrus haul out sites
- Ballast water is a big concern
- The jointly owned lands are very sensitive to development and shipping
- Aerial surveys come through this region. The low level flights caused many eggs to fall from the nest as the birds fled the noise.
- Whales are also disturbed by noise.





## Appendix 2: Questions and Answers

During the community workshop, there was a question and answer period, which included a discussion of the following topics:

- [Listed Islands of equal use] We use the islands in our approximate vicinity about 80% and 20% part of the smaller islands. The area is rather large. I'm concerned about this area. These areas are close to us and we use these areas. It's a key bird habitat and you mentioned climate change. Our ice is broken up due to climate change. Sealing is hard in this region and it's getting harder every year. In the past we had subsistence living off these mammals. We used to live off this. I just want to mention the James Bay Agreement.
- We used to hunt in Cape Dorset and we associated with Cape Dorset people. This has stopped now. When the plan is done, will we still be able to use the land as we had? What will happen now with hunting?
  - The Commission answered that that plan will not impact traditional land use.
- We hunt in your areas. The quotas you set in NU don't apply to us in Nunivak. Will this be the same in the future? Will we be constrained by what we hunt in your areas? There are some species that it seems you have no quotes for. Will that be the same for us?
  - The Commission answered that the plan will not deal with quotas.
- I understand the reason why you are here is Article 40 lands that we share and from what I understand it's a 50/50 situation. I know we both utilize these areas. When you talk to officials you have to mention our concerns.
  - The Commission answered that for the islands on the map, once the Plan has been formalized, it will reflect what is said tonight and all those who have land use concerns. We hear from everybody including exploration bodies and others. We are not changing the 50/50 use. It is entrenched in the agreement.
- Mining is delivering material through our areas in waters [Mary River]. It's affecting our sea mammals negatively. Your mining exploration affects me, our

environment, and food. Once you finalize the plan can you give us definite answers?

- The Commission answered that the proposed supply routes are currently 21 years in the future. The plans for that development are changing. NPC deals with land and sea. There may be more marine traffic in the future from activities such as mining and cruise ships. In the mapping sessions you can map on lands and marine areas.

- All nesting areas need protection from any form of development and any overuse of the islands

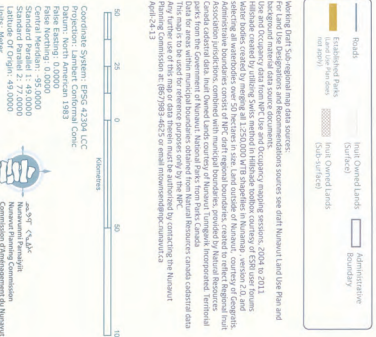
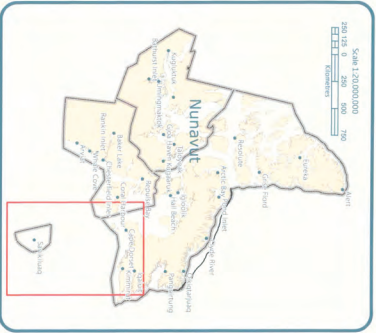

## Ivujivik – Group 1 Results



For Land Use/cover and Wetland/Nonwetland sources, 2000 to 2011 background information and recommendations sources are National Land Use and Occupancy data from the National Land Use and Occupancy Mapping System (NLUMS) and the National Wetland Inventory (NWI) for the country (1:63,000 scale).
