

Re: The Necessity of Protecting Caribou Grounds for Inuit

QWB has worked hard over the years to solidify our working relationship with the HTOs, while respecting their autonomy and their responsibility to their membership. As you know, HTO membership is open to all beneficiaries of Nunavut that are over 16 years old. We have an extensive and important range of members connected to our organizations. In understanding this, we are an important voice of Inuit on wildlife and environment matters.

QWB is writing to you today to stress the importance of caribou for Inuit. The protection of caribou grounds is paramount to Inuit in Nunavut and it must be guaranteed into the future. This is why QWB has participated in various technical meetings of the Nunavut Planning Commission. As we have stated, caribou grounds, particularly calving grounds, but also post-calving grounds, migration routes and access corridors are central to the vitality of caribou populations. We make this statement recognizing that our region has a diverse caribou population and experiences. The communities of the High Arctic are working with the federal government to develop a recovery strategy for Peary Caribou; communities on Baffin Island have been struggling with low caribou numbers all the while reinforcing the importance of protection for caribou grounds, and finally, there are reindeer in Sanikiluaq. What is consistent across the Qikiqtaaluk is the importance of caribou habitat. This is well understood in this region, proven by QIA's 2015 has resolution calling for the protection of caribou calving grounds in the Land Use Plan. At our 2015 AGM, QWB also passed a resolution calling for the protection caribou grounds. I have included a copy of that resolution here for your information.

I would encourage you, and all members of the legislative assembly to contact their own regional wildlife board for insight and advice on wildlife matters, particularly as they related to caribou grounds.
