



Wek'èezhìi Renewable Resources Board



- WRRB is a co- management board established by the Tłįcho Agreement
- Board acts in the public interest; considers the interests of all users in making decisions

Proposed actions: harvest restrictions, wolf management actions and ongoing biological monitoring







WRRB Determinations

The WRRB has sole responsibility for making a final determination with respect to a TAH for a population or stock of wildlife in Wek'èezhìı





WRRB Recommendations

- Development of criteria to protect key caribou habitat, including water crossings and tataa
- Monitor the effects of development and climate change on caribou in Wek'èezhìi










Bluenose-East Caribou Management Plan













Tłįchǫ harvesters have been limited in their harvest in order to allow the herds every opportunity to recover and increase in size.






Users and managers must act now, in whatever ways possible, to protect the herd so future recovery may be possible
