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1.1 Context

The Nunavut Planning Commission (NPC) is preparing a land use plan to guide and direct resource use and development in the Nunavut Settlement Area (NSA). As part of its efforts, the NPC is facilitating discussions in each Nunavut community on land use and resource management issues. Information that is obtained from these discussions will be used to inform decisions regarding the further development of the Nunavut Land Use Plan (NLUP).

1.2 Purpose

This report presents information obtained during the NPC's visit to the community of Salluit. The purpose of the report is to inform decisions regarding the further development of the NLUP, ensuring that the plan reflects the priorities and values of residents.

It is important to note that the information contained in the Community Report will be considered in conjunction with all other feedback when revising the DNLUP.

1.3 Methodology

Information was presented to and received from participants in Salluit in accordance with the Nunavut Planning Commission's Community Engagement Strategy (Engagement Strategy). The Engagement Strategy provides for the following methods for presenting and receiving information;

- **Elected Officials Meeting;** The NPC Chairperson and NPC staff met with senior and elected officials in the community. The development process for the DNLUP, its content and next steps were presented. Comments and questions were recorded during the session and are contained in Appendix 1.
- **Public Workshop;** A formal presentation of the Draft Plan content was provided to participants, including a slide overview of its content. Following the presentation, questions and comments were received from participants. The questions, comments and responses are contained in Appendix 2.

A mapping session followed the presentation of the Draft Plan. The mapping session involved discussions regarding the topics presented in the DNLUP and encouraged participants to identify additional areas and issues important for inclusion in a NLUP. Information received during this session was recorded by NPC staff and is included in Appendix 3.

- **Wrap Up Session;** Staff was available to discuss the areas identified during the mapping and identify any additional issues or areas of interest.

Areas that participants identified during mapping sessions as important to a particular goal have, in the majority of cases, been included in this report as they were recorded. In instances where participants identified an area that was better suited to another goal, the area has been reclassified to the more suitable goal and has been verified as appropriate to do so by the Community.

1.4 Public Awareness

The NPC raised public awareness regarding its visit to Salluit in accordance with the Engagement Strategy.

The DNLUP and supporting materials were mailed to the Mayor and Council of Salluit in September 2012. In addition, letters of invitation were sent to the Salluit Mayor and Council in advance of the NPC's visit to advise of the meetings and to encourage participation. Follow up phone calls were also made.

Public notice of the various events was provided in the following ways:

- **Nunatsiaq News;** notice of community meetings were posted in both newspapers a minimum of 45 days in advance.
- **Community radio;** notices were read by the hosts and a live interview with the Commission Chairperson was conducted.

- **Community bulletin boards;** notices were posted on bulletin boards around the community 45 days and again 14 days in advance of the meetings.
- **Community mail drop;** one page flyers that announced the meetings and their purpose were delivered to the post office in each community for all mail boxes that accept unaddressed ad-mail.
- **nunavut.ca;** the schedule of community visits, the Draft Plan, and all supporting information was available on the Commission's website.

1.5 Community Population and Participation

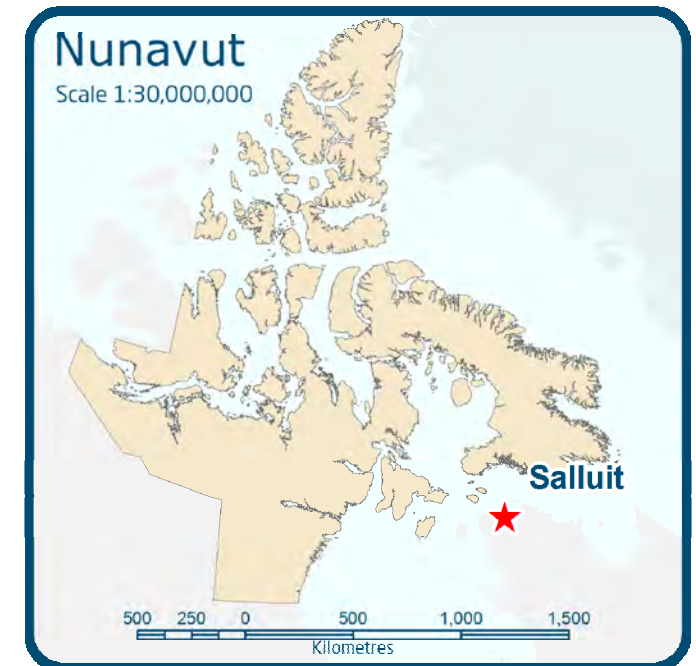


Figure 1. Location of Salluit.

Salluit is a community of approximately 1350 people (Statistics Canada, 2011 Census). It is located on the Hudson Strait in northern Quebec (see Figure 1).

The Commission visited the community on June 4-5, 2013. The meetings were scheduled for May 6-7, 2013 but were delayed due to weather. The sessions were attended as follows;

- **Elected Officials Meeting;** members of the village Council, Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Association, and land holding company attended the elected officials meeting.
- **Public Workshop;** approximately 30 people attended the presentation of the DNLUP and facilitated mapping sessions. Information was recorded in 2 separate mapping groups.
- **Wrap Up Session;** 0 people attended the wrap up session.

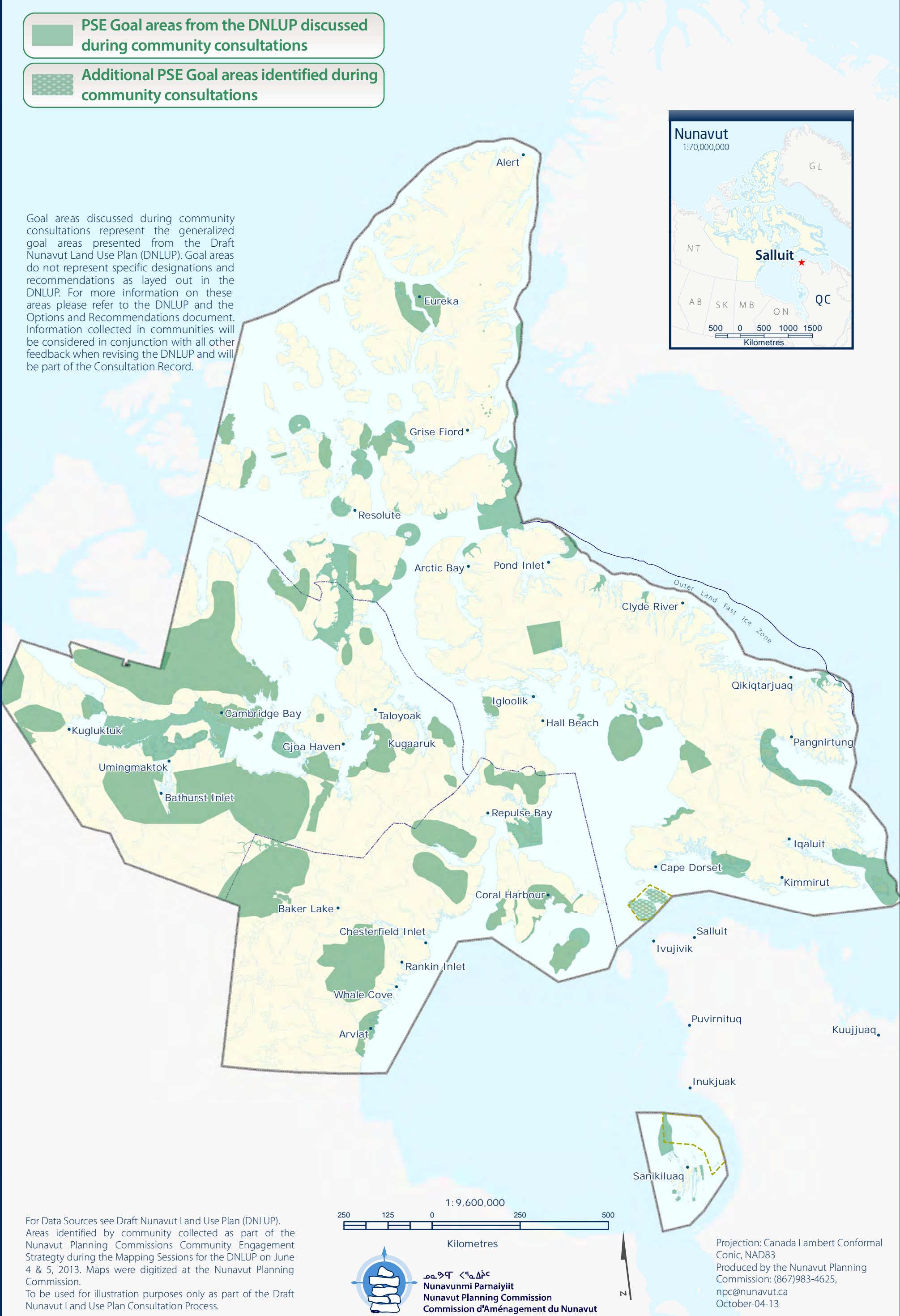

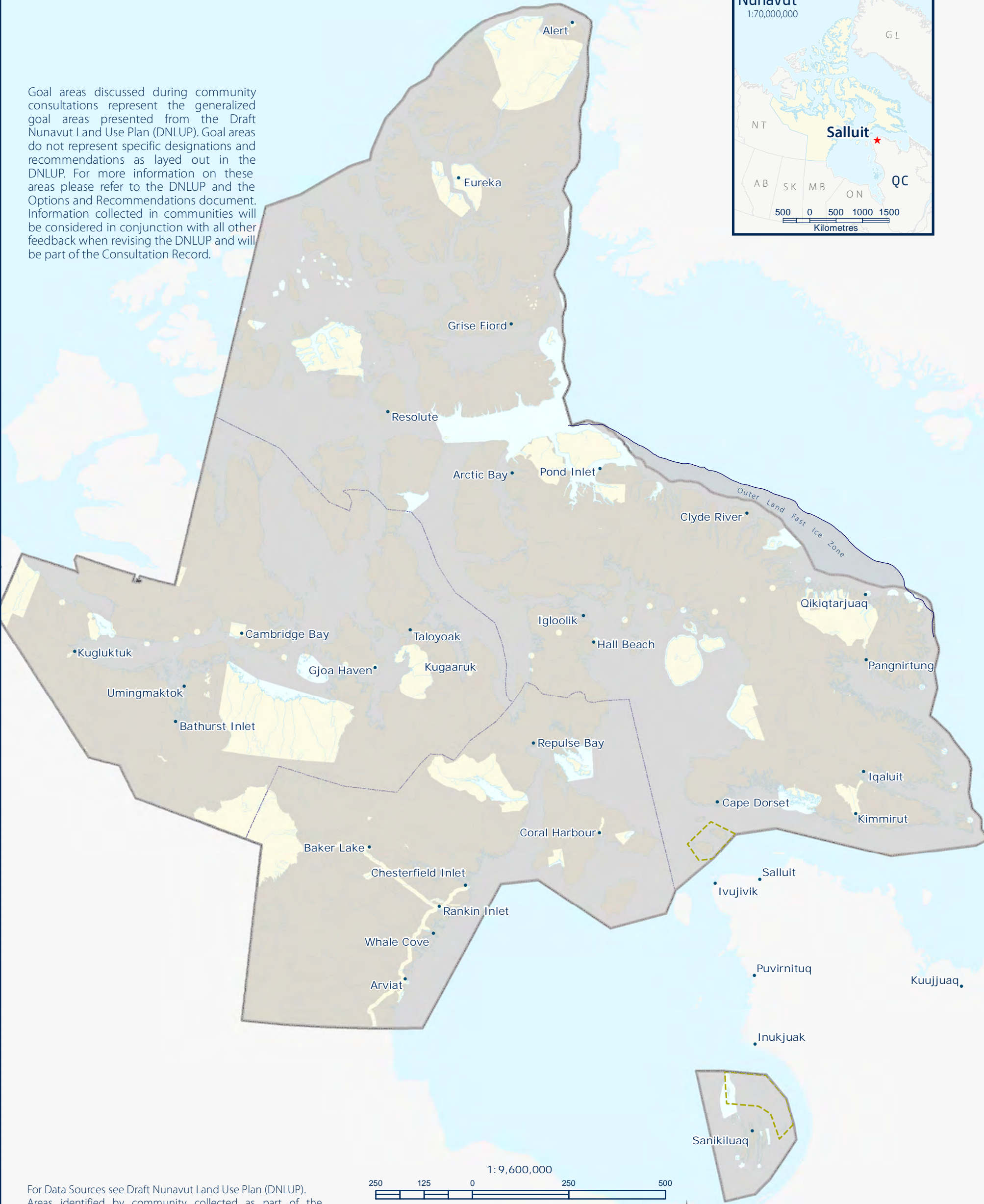

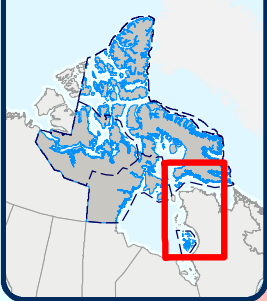

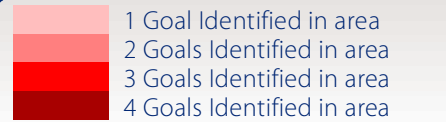


Salluit • Map 7

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Appendix 1: Elected Officials Meeting

The elected officials meeting was attended by the Mayor and members of the Hamlet Council and HTO. During the meeting, participants raised the following issues:

- Interested in how changes to the plan can be made after it is approved.
- Discussion on what would happen if there is mineral or oil and gas interest on the shared islands, and the need for NTL and Makivik to agree on the uses, as set out in Article 40 of the Nunavut Land Claims Agreement.
- Concerned about government following the plan. Discussion of enforcement under the draft Nunavut Planning and Project Assessment Act.
- Would prefer to have no development on the islands
- Concerned about oil spills in Ungava Bay, Hudson Strait and Hudson Bay.
- Concerned about hydro Quebec.
- The islands used to have a lot of caribou and now there are none.
- The governments need to work together. There should be planning at a “conference level” to determine how these lands are used.
- Concerned about ice breaking interfering with travel.
- Would like to be notified when someone wants to use the sea lane.
- Would like to have an airstrip on the islands
- Young people have lots of information. We need to listen to them too.
- The application of government laws on the islands
- Discussion of the plan approval process



Appendix 2: Questions and Answers

During the community workshop, there was a question and answer period, which included a discussion of the following topics:

- We are being told about 50/50 sharing of the land. You (from Nunavut) are doing this work. What do we have to do with the Draft Nunavut Land Use Plan? Where are we politically/practically? When you are finished implementing the law (NLUP) will we be second in line? After you have decided? Let's say we're agreed to 50/50 on the islands, perhaps the laws about how much the animals are harvested, this could be talked about. If it is 50/50, could I create my own business?
 - The Commission answered that the Makivik Corporation and NTI decided on an agreement for the lands. This issue has to be resolved with Makivik and NTI. We will not change anything regarding the islands that has been decided already. It has been worked on how Nunavik hunters harvest animals. People had asked about business on those islands. Nunavut and Nunavik will have to look at this.
- If I wanted to mark on the map regarding the harvest of walrus, let's say...should we harvest all the animals or should we leave some for others? Also, there are weather observing buildings on Nottingham Island (Old).
 - The Commission answered that the DNLUP will not shift the existing relationship. We are doing this to have guidelines for those coming up to use the land and explore. We're not stopping cultural activities.
- Even though I have not been part of the maps, I thought something was omitted. I thought Nunavik should be part of the NLUP. People go hunting walrus and beluga and are very important to us.
 - The Commission answered that these areas will be discussed during the mapping.
- We use speedboats to travel far. Will we be able to make use of islands where we travel with our boats (sometimes all the way to Coral Harbour)? To hunt freely in other islands?
 - The Commission answered that this can be mentioned to Makivik and NTI, and encouraged everyone to mark where they go hunting.



Appendix 3: Community Workshop Scanned Maps

Two groups completed the mapping session to identify important areas. This Appendix contains the maps that were used by participants to identify areas that are important to the following land use planning goals:

- Protecting and Sustaining the Environment

Also included on each map is a reference table that includes the specific values that were identified for the area.

During the mapping portion of the community workshop, the following concerns were raised that did not apply to a specific area that was identified on the maps:

- Arctic char is an important food source for the community of Salluit
- Protect the PSE areas identified but don't impact hunting
- Concerns that hunting in conservation areas might be restricted someday.
- The people of Salluit want equal use of the islands as the communities of Nunavut
- Want the entire Area of Equal Use and Occupancy protected for the community
- Would like to see caribou relocated to Nottingham Island
- The water in these islands is horrible and something should be done for cleaner water. Not much good for drinking. Have to bring fresh water from the mainland.

- This community is concerned with subsistence harvesting, coast guards ships and other commercial vessels are too close to char habitation,
- The people of Salluit are concerned with restriction of commercial char fishery.
- The people of Salluit want consultation of any developments in these islands whatever they may be.

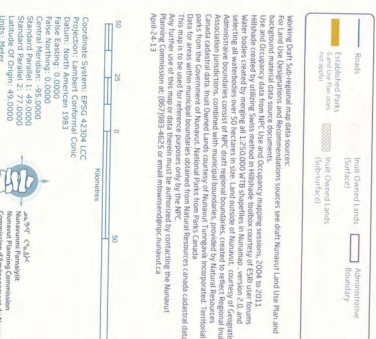
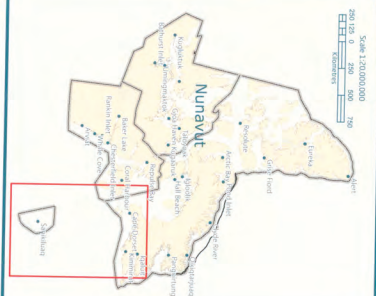


SANIKILUAQ - MAKIVIK AREAS OF EQUAL USE AND OCCUPANCY

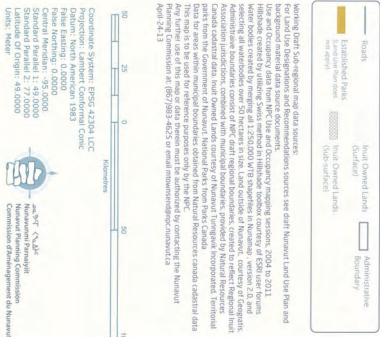
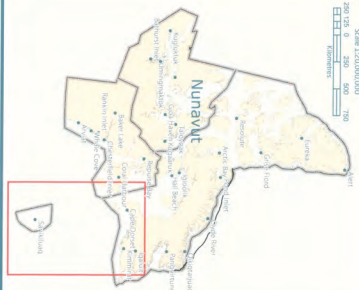


SANKILUAQ - MAKIVIK AREAS OF EQUAL USE AND OCCUPANCY

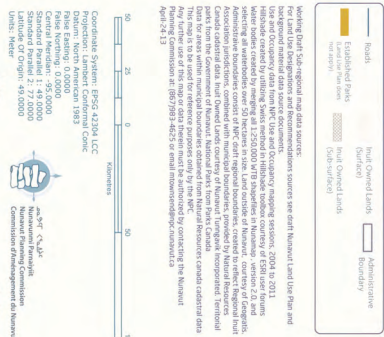

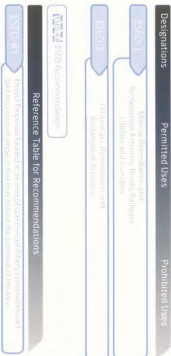

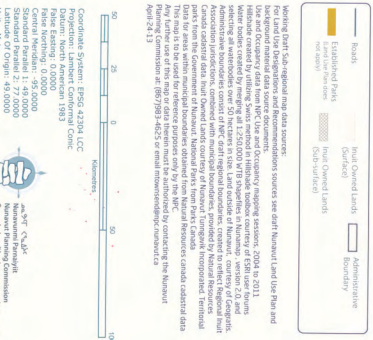


SANIKILUAQ - MAKIVIK AREAS OF EQUAL USE AND OCCUPANCY
