With exploration and development underway in the Kivalliq region, the Kivalliq Wildlife Board is also concerned about caribou populations, calving and post calving habitat. It is evident that disturbance in caribou range and habitat have an impact on the caribou. | The caribou section of the land use plan has been revised. Protected Areas and Special Management are use to protect the areas where there are no existing rights. Existing rights are protected under NUPPAA. Areas with existing rights or high mineral potential are designated Special Management. The DNLUP has been revised to address calving and post-calving areas. Changes were made to some of the recommendations to reduce fragmentation of calving and post calving areas when possible. |
